Curated by Tessa Boffin and Jean Fraser, Stolen Glances explores the diversity of lesbian identities, bringing together the work of eleven photographers from Britain and North America. Concentrating on photography which uses consciously staged and manipulated imagery, the exhibition is an essential contribution to current debates about the representation of sexuality and sexual difference. The exhibition is accompanied by a fully illustrated book edited by Tessa Boffin and Jean Fraser extending the themes in the exhibition, with thirty contributors and 150 illustrations. Silent Health: Women, Health
and Representation
Susan Brind:
The Mind Betrays the Body

This joint exhibition brings together the work of five women artists addressing the representation of the body and health. 'Silent Health' shows the work of four women; Melanie Friend, Kate Musselwhite, Claire Collison and Janice Howard commissioned in1990. Mythologies of healing and women as healers, women ageing, stress—related disease and mass media images of women's health are all explored, and the exhibition is accompanied by a colour publication with contributions from Ursula Huws, Rosy Martin, Ludmilla Jordanova, Lesley Doyle, Jessica Evans, Roberta McGrath and Jo Spence. A Camerawork touring exhibition.

By contrast Susan Brind's multi—monitor video installation looks at the brutal edge of medical surgery and acknowledges fear of pain and death. The installation aims not simply to make critical comment on the institution of medicine, but rather to investigate the complex relationship between the social body of the hospital and the private body of the individual. An Arts Council funded commission.
