CAMERAWORK, the Bethnal Green photography gallery put on better sociological and political exhibitions than any comparable institution in the world, with sense for topical issues and a conviction that the camera examines life in ways not available to any other art form.

The gallery's latest exhibition is *Silent Health: Women, Health and Representation*, opening this morning. Four photographers — Claire Collison, Melanie Friend, Janice Howard and Kate Musselwhite — have been commissioned to make work on the subject of femininity and health.

Milch is a new gallery in

Guilford Street, Bloomsbury: bumptious, charming, and with an inaugural show by recent graduates of Goldsmiths' and St Martin's.

Viv Levy, who also trained at St Martin's recently, has a double show of her abstract steel sculpture in two Wimbledon locations, the smaller sculptures in the Library Gallery at the bottom of Wimbledon Hill and the larger works at Cannizaro Park, Westside Common. The Arnolfini Gallery in Bristol has another dramatic newcomer, Miles Davies, who has made a large installation based on doors, their concept as well as their physical existence.

He is paired with Leo Davy (1924-87), a reclusive figurative and landscape artist of much originality.

Other noteworthy painting shows of a traditional but unusual nature are by Anne Madden at the New Art Centre, opening on Tuesday, and by Gary Wragg, whose new abstract works are at the Goldsmiths Gallery, opening tomorrow.

Carel Visser's geometric drawings are at the Frith

Street Gallery from Friday and at the Tate Gallery, there is a mournful retrospective of paintings by the late Sir William Coldstream.
