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HEALTH MATTERS



Peeling Potatoes in Paradise/ Mustn't Waste Time by Claire Collison

Silent Health, Women, Health and Representation, Stills Gallery, until 18 May. Topical in the month that Labour spearhead a Ministry of Women to give voice to 'the missing culture', this exhibition initiated by Camerawork (London) examines women's attitudes to their health.

As you enter the gallery, twenty-four colour portraits of fortysomething women stare out at you. Melanie Friend's very striking photographic portraits are accompanied by statements which reveal diverse

reactions to the menopause: 'tell them it's hell', an 'invisible disability'. For another woman 'taking HRT (Hormone Replacement Therapy) felt like regaining control'. Portraits and taped monologues by Anna Raeburn, Barbara Cartland and Kailash Puri draw out the emotional and physical stresses of ageing for women.

Claire Collison's response to the vulnerability of health is to use symbolic imagery in photo-montages.

She creates a shrine to Faith, Hope, Charity and Selfishness; each icon presents a female torso containing haunting images of children, school and hospital. Her two large photographs, 'Peeling Potatoes in Paradise' and 'Reconciliation' are also intriguing. In sharp contrast is Kate Musselwhite's confrontational sabotage of media images; she uses the advertisers' billboard or magazine to challenge women's acceptance of standard views on sex and health.

Janice Howard addresses the mythical images of femininity in a photo-installation which recalls a stone circle. The repeated image of a chair is decorated with the garbs of woman as carer (a nurse's uniform) or as witch (pokey hat and cloak). This is indeed a thought-provoking exhibition, and the lack of biographical information about the contributors underscores the fact that their main concern is the message.
